COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: History (6th Grade, Starter)

The Asian International School

I. INSTRUCTIONAL RESOURCES

II. COURSE PREREQUISITE

Students must meet the minimum requirements of the Asian International School to demonstrate English proficiency and show readiness to take the History course offered to students by the International Program.

III. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Students will learn in depth about the historical methods, ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome. Following an ancient time frame, students will explore geography, social structure, law, government, belief systems, economics and trade, culture and technology. Using a range of written texts and visual images, including primary sources, students participate in engaging learning activities that promote cooperation and communication while also developing analytical and critical thinking skills.

IV. COURSE GOALS

Students will:

- be actively involved in the world through critical understanding of world history and its presentday implications
- be able to communicate about historical issues and articulate views about history in an organized and logical framework.
- be improving the four key English skills of reading, writing, speaking and listening.

V. GRADING

Student progress made during the course taking will be assessed through achievement tests as well as other assessments designed, planned, and implemented by the teachers. The following grading scale will be operated separately in each semester.

- 1. Achievement Tests (60%)
 - Mid-term (30%)
 - Final Exam (30%)
- 2. Other Assessments (40%)
 - Group Tasks (15%): These may be additionally classified as club activities. Only two per year or one per semester is required for the purposes of assessment. Timing is done at the discretion of the teacher. However, more may be done as learning exercises.

- Nelsonnet worksheets (15%): Only four or two per semester are required for the purpose of assessment. Timing is done at the discretion of the teacher. However, more may be done as learning exercises.
- Class Performance: Attendance and Participation (10%)
